



Lent Season Begins

February 14 signals the beginning of the Lenten Season for 2018 with the Ash Wednesday Service and Holy Communion beginning at 7:00 p.m. Services will be held every Wednesday night thereafter at 7:00 p.m. through March 21.



Church and state are about to collide on the calendar. Ash Wednesday, when Christians are smudged with a reminder of death, falls on gushy, lovey Valentine's Day. And Easter, the most important Christian observance, lands on April Fools' Day, when we need to be careful what to believe. The two mashups have not happened together since 1945. Easter was most recently on April 1, or April Fools' Day, in 1956, but Ash Wednesday did not fall on Valentine's Day then because it was a leap year.

What any of this means for you depends on how closely you follow religious rules. Let's start with Ash Wednesday, when some Christians are expected to abstain from meat, and to fast, meaning refrain from eating big meals. So if you take your sweetie out for a meaty feast, you're probably doing it wrong. After all, there's the separation of church and steak. There's a higher emphasis given to fast and abstinence on Ash Wednesday than on a relatively normative Friday during Lent. Many will celebrate Valentine's Day on the weekend before or after. And, no, the ashes distributed at church this year won't be red as a nod to Valentine's Day, though it is named for a saint.

Valentine's Day and April Fools' Day always fall on Feb. 14 and April 1 respectively. Ash Wednesday and Easter move around a lot. Easter lands on the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the spring equinox. It's always between March 22 and April 25. To pinpoint Ash Wednesday, back up six weeks and four days from Easter.

Ash Wednesday was on Valentine's Day in 1945, 1934 and 1923, but the last time before then was 1877.

Easter was on April 1 in 1956, 1945, 1934 and 1923, but before that you have to go back to 1888, a leap year. We won't have to wait too long before this all happens again in 2029. The calendar oddity could provide fodder for preachers' sermons.

If we can believe the numbers we see on the internet, 45% of adult Christians receive ashes, and 54% of Americans celebrate Valentine's Day. The number of people who definitely or probably play a trick on April Fools' Day is 77%, which sounds high and will probably be lower this year because most of us are not at work or school on Sunday. And 80% of American adults celebrate Easter. That includes the secular traditions like dyeing eggs and baskets of jelly beans.


One person already has a plan for an Easter trick: "I'll tell my kids to hunt for eggs that I didn't hide." Wouldn't that would be a mean thing to do?

Shrove Tuesday & Ash Wednesday





Ash Wednesday signals the beginning of the season of Lent. Lent is a time to prepare for Easter. There are forty days in Lent, not counting Sundays. If you look at our Church Calendar, you can count these days.

before The dav Ash Wednesday is called Shrove Tuesday ("shrove" comes from a word that means to have our sins forgiven), or Mardi Gras (which means "Fat Tuesday" in the French language), or Pancake Day. It is called Pancake Day, because people usually eat pancakes on this day. They eat these delicious



pancakes, which might be covered in butter and syrup, on Shrove Tuesday because pancakes are made with eggs and milk and oil. A long time ago people didn't eat any eggs, milk or oil at all during the season of Lent! So the day before Ash Wednesday they used up all of their eggs and milk and oil by making pancakes!


"Adult Christian Education Studies"

Helping Others Answer the Call

It's been said that the greatest days in your life are the day you were born and the day you figured out why. Indeed, one of the most significant discoveries you can make is discovering what God has created you for.

I was reminded of this recently as we studied the first reading for the second Sunday after Epiphany. In 1 Samuel 3 we read of how Samuel discovered his calling. Three times the boy Samuel heard the voice of God calling and three times the boy ran to his master Eli as he assumed it was Eli who was calling him. When it happened a third time, Eli realized the voice calling the boy must be God's. So he instructed Samuel to go back and when he heard the voice call to him again, simply say "Speak, for your servant is listening."

This lesson serves as an excellent reminder that not only are we to seek to discover our own calling from God, but also help others to hear and answer their calls too. As Eli mentored Samuel in the faith and helped him to hear and recognize the call of God, all God's faithful are called to help mentor and guide others, especially those who are younger, to discover how God is calling them to live and to serve.

All across the Texas District congregation members are concerned about the future of the church. And there is good reason for concern as they look around and see aging pastors and congregations, dwindling youth and children's programs, and little movement among young people in preparation for Christian ministry. But instead of wringing our hands there is something that each of us can and should be doing. Maybe a significant part of our own calling is helping others discover theirs. Maybe we are called to be Elis to invest in young Samuels... or Pauls to invest in young Timothys.

Inevitably the question will be asked: How? How does an older person meaningfully engage in the faith development of a younger person? The key is to get back to the basics of living out our faith in community. The Christian faith compels us to engage with others around us no matter what age, race, or socio-economic status they are. Let's join Jesus on his mission and get to know our neighbors again, especially those who are younger or different. Love them like Jesus would, without judgement or shame, but pure, grace-filled kindness and love that can communicate across every social barrier we think might be there. And most of all, when the time is right and one comes to you seeking guidance, like Eli you can point him or her to God and teach him or her to say with an open heart, "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening."
